BAD SPEAKING HABITS...

- × Speak too softly
- × Speak too quickly
- × Speak too loudly
- × Use fillers (like, um, you know)
- × No eye contact
- × Turn back to the audience
- × Fidget
- × Watch the clock
- × Monotone voice
- × Slouch while speaking
- × Gesture wildly

WHAT IS IMPROV?

- A form of live theatre in which the plot, characters and dialogue are made up in the moment
- Mostly consists of fast-paced, comedic games



HOW CAN IMPROV HELP WITH PUBLIC SPEAKING?

- Approach situations with a positive attitude and see yourself for what you can contribute
- Learn how to connect with your audience and feel comfortable making eye contact with them
- Become more concise in your speech
- Show passion and enthusiasm with your words, voice and physicality
- Overcome fears and anxiety of making mistakes

Step 1: Prewriting

- × Choose a topic you feel strongly about
- × Evaluate your potential audience
- × Understand your purpose
- × Research and brainstorm

- × Finish with a strong conclusion

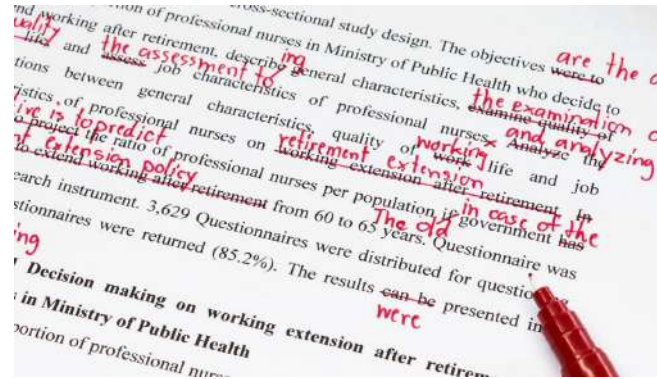

Brief Story

- Funny story
- Related to the theme of the speech

Bold Statement

- Interesting fact
- Unusual or startling statistic

Question

- Rhetorical (no answer needed)
- Raise your hand if...

Illustration

- Visual chart
- Meme or image
- Prop or object

Quotation

- Famous person or not so much
- Unique or unusual
- Something people haven't heard
