## How Does This Relate To Literary Analysis?

To write a literary analysis essay, you can take a plot element and make it the topic (thesis) of your writing.

- Compare the same themes of two books by two different authors.
- Explore the similarities and differences in plot elements between the movie version and text version of the same book.
- Discuss how the setting of the story is central to the message the author is trying to convey and would not be as effective in a different time or place.
- Compare the motives of one character to another and use their words and actions to support your comparison.

#### Literary Analysis: Button, Button

What does the dialogue reveal about Norma's motivation for pushing the button?

Strategy: CER

- Claim: rewrite the question into a statement
- Evidence: provide quotes to prove the statement

 Reason: explain the quotes and how they prove the claim Authors employ many tools to reveal a character's thoughts, feelings, and desires. In the story "Button, Button" author Richard Matheson uses dialogue to reveal Norma's motivations for pushing the button.

In speaking to her husband, Norma says "...someone you've never seen in your life and never will see, someone whose death you don't even have to know about..." is justification for pushing the button (pg. 6).

Norma thinks the death won't matter and that it isn't important because it isn't someone she knows. She believes this death will not affect her life in any way. The dialogue shows Norma to be very self-centered as she views the world as only relevant to her own circumstances.

#### Button, Button Discussion Questions

- 1. Describe the setting of the story. How do you think it plays into Norma's motivations to push the button?
- 2. Who are the main characters and what character types would you describe them as?
- 3. How would you describe the main conflict of the story?
- In the story, Norma comes up with reasons to justify what she is doing, even though it is wrong. Do you think people do this in real life? Explain.
