










## Warm Up


- Using Narrative Dialogue
- Have a Reason
  - Use to move story along or to better understand characters, setting, or plot.
- \* Plan Ahead
  - o Decide where dialogue will best fit and make the most sense.
- \* <u>Use for Emphasis</u>
  - Too much talking can be boring, hard to follow, or weigh your writing down. Be picky about when characters speak.
- \* <u>Use the Right Word</u>
  - o But don't overdo it. Examples: said, asked, whispered, replied, yelled, demanded...
  - **Correct Format** 
    - The 7 rules for proper punctuation

Later, we will be sure to write them down in your narrative notebook.






